### WELCOME TO SPRING 2024!

We are getting deep into the second semester of this school year. In an effort to keep our tutors connected with one another, but to also share our mission and progress with people and organizations with interests aligned with the Catholic Tutor Corps, we will be sending out a newsletter periodically. With almost 70 tutors working in classrooms this year, some are new to the CTC and some have been with us for 10, 15, even 20 years. So, for those new to us, and not so new, a brief recap of where we have been may be in order.

In 2002 the CTC began with two tutors. Our mission then, and now, has been to give extra help to students who for a variety of reasons, have fallen behind their peers and need additional help in getting up to grade level performance. Over the next twenty years the CTC's corps of tutors grew to 80 tutors helping students in 12 schools in Minneapolis and St. Paul. As most of you know, when Covid arrived the lights went out in the schools and the tutors all went home. Over 2021 and 2022 our schools began welcoming tutors back into the classroom. Since that time, the CTC has been rebuilding it's efforts in the schools. The need for tutors in our schools only grew as a result of Covid. Many more students fell further behind as schools dealt with the pandemic, particularly students that CTC works with.

Currently CTC tutors are in classrooms at: Risen Christ, Blessed Trinity, St. John Paul II, St. Helena, Community of the Saints, St. Jerome, Ascension, St. Peter Claver, Sacred Heart and newly added schools: St. Alphonsus, Immaculate Conception, and Annunciation School. There is always a need for more tutors in most of these schools and there are schools that we currently do not serve that have reached out to us asking to be part of our program.

In the past we have partnered with a number of organizations to both recruit tutors and to obtain some funding for our work. In addition to working with many area parishes, the CTC has worked with the University of St. Thomas Law School, University of Minnesota Newman Center, the Catholic Community Foundation, St. Paul Seminary, and more. With an all-volunteer, grassroots organization like the CTC, our best marketing tool is our current tutors who share their stories and experiences with friends, family members, and work colleagues. We always welcome stories from our tutors talking about why they have enlisted in our mission and experiences they have had in working with students. Three of those stories are included in this newsletter. One tutor has been with us for about 8 years, another almost 20. Both started out tutoring one day a week and now go into the schools 2 or 3 days a week. That is a testament to how rewarding they have found the work. If you would like to share a story that can be included in a future newsletter, it is most welcome.

Our tutors come from many different places and backgrounds, all with varied connections and roots to their communities. Hopefully, as we continue to grow, we can tap into those diverse roots to connect with more generous people willing to sit shoulder to shoulder with these students teaching them, guiding them, mentoring them. The greatest reward that comes from this work is hearing those four magic words from a student.....Now I Get It!
